

Dear Parent/Guardian,

With the rainy season upon us, it is time to think about flood safety. Floods are the most common and widespread of all natural hazards. Even very small creeks and streams that may appear harmless in dry weather can flood.

The Santa Clara Valley Water District provides information to help individuals and families prepare for floods and minimize potential danger. During the rainy season, the water district also provides free, filled sandbags at various locations around the county. It is important to remember that irrespective of where we live, the roads we travel on may flood. Therefore, everyone needs to understand what to do if this happens.

Flood safety tips:

- Stay away from flooded areas, even if it seems safe. The water may still be rising.
- If you come upon floodwater, stop. Turn around and go another way. Climb to higher ground.
- Never try to walk, swim or play in floodwater because it may be moving very fast. (NOTE: Less than six inches of fast moving floodwater can knock people off their feet. Two feet of water will float a car.)
- If you are in a car, get out immediately and move to higher ground.
- Stay away from all downed power lines.
